For years, residents of Mudia Ahmednagar village have known about the medicinal and other benefits of the local plants that grow in the area. There were very few besides them who had the knowledge.

However, the forest department, along with other bio-diversity experts, recently decided to catalogue all plants in the area and filed a report titled the 'People Biodiversity Register'.

The report has been sent to the state biodiversity board for registration of the plants species found in the area.

"We have prepared a report detailing the local species of flora and have also mentioned special properties of the plant, if any, and how villagers have been using them for their wellbeing," said Dharam Singh, divisional forest officer. He added that 175 species of flora was found in this village which included nearly 35 medicinal herbs like achyranthes aspera, adhatoda visica and latjira.

"Our ancestors used many plants for healing purposes but such knowledge became extinct with their demise. A retired teacher, Rukum Singh (68), has been using some of the herbs found in the village to cure diseases like gout, piles, leucorrhea and blood pressure. We have discussed such things in detail in the report so that the knowledge can be passed on to others," said Singh.

Once the state biodiversity board registers the report, it will become a legal document.

"Companies across the world have been fighting to get patents on flora and fauna of a particular region. For instance, our ancestors for centuries have been using turmeric for

healing purpose but in 90s, Germany had claimed its patent right for discovering th healing effect of turmeric. However, the claim of Germany was rejected when India ha shown few research papers on the same topic which were conducted in 60s," said Alo Khare, head of the technical support group (TSG) of this project and a faculty membe with the botany department in Bareilly College.

But most moralists allow that our duty to increase happiness and diminish misery is not limited to the human race, but must be extended to all beings that feel pleasure and pain. Surely it must be quite clear that we are bound to consider the happiness of animals,

- (3) In the case of animals, as in the case of men, it is only justifiable to inflict pain in order to obtain some greater good, which more than compensates for the evil of the pain. This is the justification always urged by the defenders of vivisection. It is argued that surgical experiments upon living animals will lead to such medical discoveries as will alleviate human suffering.
 (4) Therefore, as human beings are of grater account and more susceptible to pain than the lower animals, pain may be inflicted on frogs and dogs in order that new means may be discovered of curing the diseases of men.
- (5) Whether this argument is entirely convincing or not, it is noticeable that in the controversy no defender of vivisection ventures to assert that the pain of the lower animals is not an evil in itself. It is assumed to be an evil whenever attempts are made to justify it by the demonstration of the great results that are to be expected from vivisection.
- (6) In the East, kindness to animals becomes a sixth sense because of religious sanctions. In several eastern religions, injury to animals is taboo, particularly in the Jain religion. Hence animals are treated well and with kindness. In view of this, there is less need in the East to promote societies like the famous Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals so common in the West.
